## Capital "Project Preserve Bay": Status

As reported in the Spring Newsletter, "Project Preserve Bay", funded through a grant from Senator Craig Johnson, was expected to be ready to be executed this summer. Per our engineers, Sidney Bowne and Son, we wanted the project to start this August and expected it to take about 30 calendar days to complete. As noted at the Village meeting and previous Newsletter, the actual start date continues to be dependent on the funding agreement with the NYS Dormitory Authority finalizing the "disbursement agreement" which allows the village to draw on the funds needed for the project. Since Albany must pass the New York State Budget prior to the NYS Dormitory Authority releasing the contracts, Plandome Heights has no choice but to wait it out. To be continued! ■

## **Animal Control**

Clerk-Treasurer Marianne Lobocarro has received information from the new Town of North Hempstead Director of Inter-Municipal Affairs, Rafe Leiber, regarding raccoon sightings in our Village and indeed the community at large. The Town of North Hempstead has no jurisdiction in dealing with this matter. As the Village is in close proximity to Manhasset Bay, we have to learn to co-exist with many different wildlife species. The New York State Department of Environmental

Conservation (NYSDEC) will handle raccoons if there is human exposure, meaning someone is attacked or if the raccoon is trapped in their home. You can contact them at 631-444-0345 or [R1info@gw.dec.state.ny.us](mailto:R1info@gw.dec.state.ny.us). If that is not the case, you can contact a certified "Nuisance Wildlife Trapper". A list of the trappers is available in the village office. For further information, you can contact Mike Clark, NYSDEC Wildlife Biologist at 631-444-0311 or our Village Clerk. ■

It is very important that we all do our share to help keep the mosquito population as contained as possible. You can help. Please ensure there is no stagnant water on or about your

property. Some examples include birdbaths, unused tires or tire swings which may be hanging on trees. Mosquitoes love to breed in stagnant water. ■

## **Memo from our Emergency Management Coordinator**

It has been several weeks since the Thursday afternoon storm that rolled through Great Neck and our Village. While our Village's main damage to property was from winds, which came up Cove Drive to Plandome Road, many households suffered from loss of electricity until the next evening. This storm, which lasted less than a half hour, devastated parts of Great Neck and Kings Point.

Tree maintenance should be performed periodically by every homeowner, thinning out top-heavy trees and removing dead limbs and branches can help reduce the chance of damage to your property.

As we enter into hurricane season it is vital that each and every family be prepared for what could be a major storm event. There are many publications available online from The National Hurricane Center ([www.nhc.noaa.gov](http://www.nhc.noaa.gov)) and the Red Cross ([www.nassauredcross.org](http://www.nassauredcross.org)) which contain valuable information for you and your family. A free "Your Family Disaster Plan" template from FEMA and the American Red Cross will be posted on-line at [www.plandomeheights-ny.gov](http://www.plandomeheights-ny.gov) and also available at the Village office.

We have all experienced blackouts in the past, most last only a few hours. What would you do if LIPA could not restore electricity for five to seven days? Or all roads around you are impassable for a couple of days? Major storms are rare here on the North Shore, but they do happen, ask some of the village's seniors if they were here in '38.

The Scout "Be Prepared" motto cannot be stressed enough. ■

## **Summer LIPA News**

LIPA sent all villages this notice and asked that we circulate to residents:

With the weather hot hot hot, the Long Island Power Authority (LIPA) is encouraging its customers to take advantage of its rebate programs for retiring and replacing old central air conditioning units, pool pumps and recycling old refrigerators. This can help Long Islanders save money on their energy bills and increase their home's energy efficiently.

LIPA is introducing a new *Cool Homes Retirement* program, allowing customers to replace aging central air conditioning units (installed prior to 2004) with a qualifying high efficiency model. Depending on the energy efficiency rating of the new unit, customers will be eligible to receive up to \$700 in LIPA rebates as well as possible federal tax credits. Central air conditioning systems 10 years or older can be as much as 40% less efficient than new, high-efficiency models. A new high-efficiency unit can save customers an average of \$250 a year. In addition, LIPA is continuing to offer a \$75 rebate to customers who purchase or replace their older single-speed pool pump with a two-speed pump, or a \$200 rebate for installing a qualifying variable-speed pump. To be eligible for the *Energy Efficient Pool Pump* rebate, customers must use a participating

LIPA contractor for the installation. Visit

LIPA is also incentivizing residential customers to rid themselves of old energy consuming refrigerators or freezers. The *Refrigerator Recycling Program* provides customers with the opportunity to receive a \$35 reward when they have their old refrigerator and freezers picked up free of charge. Recycling the old appliance may result in savings \$100 or more per year in energy costs and it assures the old unit will be properly recycled, preventing up to 95% of it from entering the waste stream. The programs listed above are part of LIPA'S *Efficiency Long Island* initiative. This initiative is a 10-year, \$924 million energy efficiency program launched in 2009, which offers a wide array of incentives, rebates and initiatives to LIPA's residential and commercial customers to assist them in reducing their energy usage and thereby lowering their bills.
